

Capable of explaining that here we are in the presence of a 'special' museum, a 'place' more than a mere museum.

No one would dream of evoking a museum with a drawing of the building rather than of a celebrated masterpiece contained in it because no other museum can be grasped in a single glance like the Villa Borghese. How do you grasp the Uffizi building in a mere glance? Or the Brera museum? Or the Louvre or National Gallery? It would be unthinkable! The first thing that our young visitors of tomorrow will become aware of when they read the opening and closing words accompanying the daytime and night-time images of the Villa with their inevitably poetic tone is the appeal and mystery of this house of dreams. A place whose inexhaustible and dangerous beauty comes from its ability to preserve time in the darkness and silence that descends upon it every evening and that makes it shine at the start of every new day.

A fairytale about a beauty that even with the playful tones of the book will daunt, excite and scare children as fairytales are supposed to do – as when one approaches the cottage in the woods in Hansel and Gretel.


## PAULINE BORGHESE


a king! That basket looks really heavy and holding it up all that time must have been really tiring...
